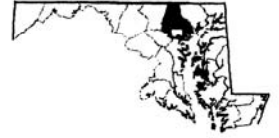

### **Genealogical Tip of the Quarter: Research at Cemetery**

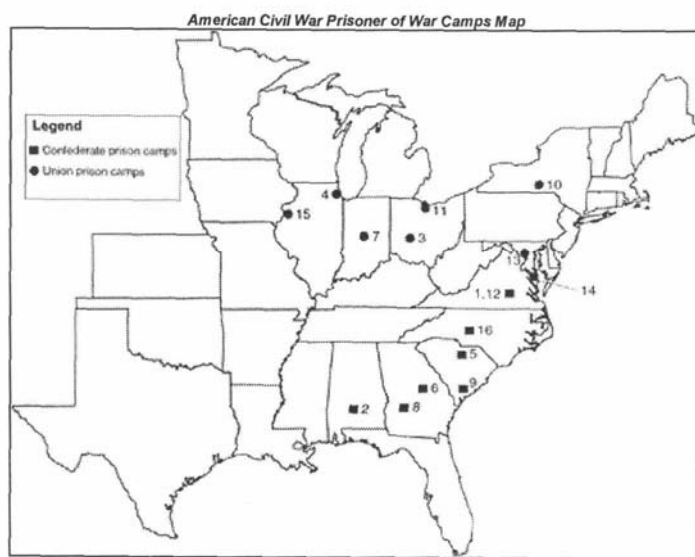
When requesting a cemetery office to perform research to determine if someone is buried in the cemetery it is sometimes better to do on site visit then call or write a letter. Request a list of all persons buried in the same plot. Obtain a copy of their records and plot showing who is buried where. Plus any letters or documents they have in their files. After visiting the office always do a site visit of the cemetery plot and take photos of the tombstones. Even if the office states their may not be tombstones. Transcribe all information on the tombstone even if a photo was taken. In case you cannot read the tombstone information on the photo later. Note all who are buried in at the plot from the tombstone inscriptions and compare them to cemetery records. You may find additional persons burred that the cemetery office did not know or tell you. Offer to pay for their services.

## **ANDERSONVILLE PRISON (CAMP SUMTER)**

Kenneth Zimmerman was the speaker on February 28, 2010 at Baltimore County Genealogical Society

Camp Sumter, commonly called Andersonville, was one of the largest military prisons established by the Confederacy during the Civil War. In existence for 14 months, over 45,000 Union enlisted soldiers were confined at the prison. Of these, almost 13,000 died from disease, poor sanitation, malnutrition, overcrowding, and exposure to the elements. The largest number held in the 26½-acre stockade at any one time was more than 32,000, during August of 1864. Today the beauty of the prison site belies the suffering that once took place inside the stockade. The DVD titled “Voices from Andersonville” from Friends of Andersonville 2005 was shown at The DVD is shown at the Andersonville National Historic Site Visitor Center. A slide presentation of the camp and cemetery was shown. He gave an overview of other Civil War Prison Camps and how to access prison records.

### **Andersonville Prison**

- Construction began first week of January 1864
- Completed prison is shaped like a parallelogram Enclosed a total of 26 ½ acres, 1520 long North to South. 779 feet wide East to West
- Prison was originally intended to confine 6,000 to 8,000 prisoners with 10,000 being the maximum
- Prison Population: Approx. 45,000 total prisoners for the 14 months of operation, Aprox. 400 United States Colored Troops. Prison Peak population Approx. 33,000 in August 1864
- Total Death 12,920 29% death rate. Peak number of deaths in one month approx.. 300. They Averaged 100 deaths per day which occurred in August 1864
- Raiders were gangs of prisoners that preyed upon their fellow prisoners. Six of the gang leaders were tried in a prisoner court for murder. The Raiders were found guilty and sentence to death by hanging.
- Escape- 329 successful escapes
- Guards Peak population August 1864 was approx. 3600
- Captain Heinrich Witz Commandant of Prison Stockade from April 1864 until end of War April 1865. The only man convicted and executed for war crimes enacted during the Civil War. Arrested May 5, 1865 and Hanged November 10, 1865.
- Adam Swarner, a young Cavalryman from New York State was the first prisoner to die at Andersonville. Five months later, his brother Jacob was buried in grave number 4,005 of the National Cemetery
- Clara Barton was one of the principal people behind the establishment of the National Cemetery at Andersonville. She raised the Stars and Stripes over the cemetery for the first time on August 17, 1865.
- No other person worked as hard to preserve Andersonville Prison as Woman's Relief Corps President Elizabeth Turner. A monument was erected in honor of Turner at the prison site ten years after her death.
- During the Civil War approximately 460,000 Confederate soldiers were taken prisoner by the North. The Confederacy claimed more than 210,000. Overcrowding, disease, starvation, and unimaginable cruelty were commonplace in Civil War Prisons. More than 25,000 Confederate soldiers died in prison during the Civil War. More than 30,000 Federal prisoners of war died in prison.

### **Andersonville Prisoners of War, Records**

#### **A. Source: Ancestry.com**

The most infamous Confederate prison camp of the Civil War, Andersonville housed an estimated 45,000 Union soldiers during the war. This database is a collection of records compiled by the National Park Service of camp inmates between 1863 and 1865. Researchers will find rank, unit, death, and capture information in addition to the inmate's name and state of residence. In some cases, the National Park Service has more information for some soldiers. Inquiries regarding these men can be directed to: National Park Service, Andersonville National Historic Site, Rt. 1, Box 800, Andersonville, GA, 31711. With over 37,000 records, this

collection can be an enormous help to researchers of Union ancestors who were captured by the Confederate States of America in the later years of the war.

**B. Source: Civil Soldiers & Sailors System** <http://www.itd.nps.gov/cwss/prisoners.htm>

This website has a searchable database for Fort McHenry (Confederate Soldiers) and Andersonville (Union Soldiers) Prisoners. The database has soldiers who were at Andersonville and if buried at Andersonville National Cemetery. The database is maintained by the National Park Service.

Andersonville, or Camp Sumter as it was officially known, was one of the largest of many Confederate military prisons established during the Civil War. It was built early in 1864 after Confederate officials decided to move the large number of Federal prisoners kept in and around Richmond, Virginia, to a place of greater security and a more abundant food supply. During the 14 months the prison existed, more than 45,000 Union soldiers were confined here. Of these, almost 13,000 died from disease, poor sanitation, malnutrition, overcrowding, or exposure to the elements.

Note: Do not use the Cemeteries link on the Civil Soldiers & Sailors System to find Prisoners buried at Andersonville National Cemetery.

**C Andersonville Prisoner of War -John L. Ransom**

John L. Ransom was born in 1843. He joined the [Union Army](#) during the [American Civil War](#) in November 1862 and served as Quartermaster of Company A, 9th Michigan Volunteer Cavalry. In 1863 Ransom was captured in Tennessee and taken to [Andersonville](#), Georgia. During his imprisonment he kept a diary of his experiences. On the 6th July, 1864 he wrote: "Boiling hot, camp reeking with filth, and no sanitary privileges; men dying off over 140 per day. Stockade enlarged, taking in eight or ten more acres, giving us more room, and stumps to dig up for wood to cook with. Jimmy Devers has been a prisoner over a year and, poor boy, will probably die soon. Have more mementos than I can carry, from those who have died, to be given to their friends at home. At least a dozen have given me letters, pictures, etc., to take North."

John L. Ransom's book, [Andersonville Diary](#), was published in 1881. He died at the age 76 years on 23rd September 1919 in Los Angeles County.

In the book is a "LIST OF THE DEAD" on page 193 thru 286. "The following are those who died and were buried at Andersonville, with full name, Co., Regt., date of death and No. of grave in the Cemetery at that place, alphabetically arranged by States. The No. before each name is the same as marked at the head of the graves. The list will be found to be very accurate."

Maryland List of Dead is on page 213 and 214. Also page 287 and 288 has the "Recapitulation of Death by States. The book has a list of Officers Imprisoned at Camp Asylum, Columbia SC.

## ***Andersonville Prison* February 1864 - April 1865**

During the summer months, more than 100 prisoners died every day. Others fell victim to thieves and marauders among their fellow captives. The desperate situation led a Confederate medical commission to recommend relocating those prisoners who were not too ill to move, and in September 1864, as William T. Sherman's advancing army approached, most of Andersonville able-bodied inmates were sent to other camps.

In the autumn of 1864, after the [capture of Atlanta](#), all the prisoners who could be moved were sent to [Millen, Georgia](#), and [Florence, South Carolina](#). At Millen, better arrangements prevailed, and when, after General [William Tecumseh Sherman](#) began his [march to the sea](#), the prisoners were returned to Andersonville, the conditions there were somewhat improved.

Remaining in operation until the end of the war, Andersonville held more captured Union soldiers than any other Confederate camp, a total of more than 45,000, nearly 30 percent of whom died in captivity. The North had learned of the camp's appalling conditions well before the emaciated survivors were released in 1865, and outraged citizens urged retribution on Southern prisoners of war. That was hardly necessary: the Union had its own wretched prison camps, including Elmira, New York, where the death rate approached Andersonville, even though the North was far better equipped to cope with captured soldiers. Mismanagement and severe shortages were more to blame for the horrors of Andersonville than any deliberate attempt to mistreat prisoners.

## **Official German Historical Records –Ahnentafel associated from the SS and the Nazi regime**

Permission has been granted to Baltimore County Genealogical Society, Inc from Shirley Riemer, Der Blumenbaum Editor to reprint the article that was in the Der Blumenbaum Vol. 27, No. 2 November, December 2009 issue for "Reading the *Ahnenpaß*" on pages 81 thru 83.

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The records housed at the National Archives at College park, Maryland 8601 Adelphi Rod College Park, MD 207040-6001. The Research hours are Monday, Tuesday, and Saturday 9am to 5pm. Plus on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday 9am to 9pm. No records are retrieved from the stacks on Saturday or in the evening.

Elaine Zimmerman BCGS member and her cousin Kathy Barker used these records. There are indexes for German enlisted, officers and government employees. Find the surname in the alphabetical index then go to the appropriate microfilm roll. Search the microfilm for your specific surname and if your become lucky it may be your family. Even if you do not read German then you should still not have difficulty. If you happen to find a file related to your family you will have some valuable information such as birth, marriage, death, religion and locations. These documents provide a family history and piece of world history. We found no family match.

David Greene states "Recently I purchased a copy of a Nazi *Ahnenpaß*, undated but certainly published in the late 1930s. It contains blanks for ancestry for five generations in all lines, as well as forms to be completed that provide the evidence for each genealogical connection. The purpose of the book was to enable its owner to demonstrate his (or her?) "Aryan" ancestry and prove that it was untainted -- or tainted only in certain ways, for the Nazi laws were as specific as those of antebellum Louisiana -- by aboriginal (that is, native Australian or American Indian), Gypsy, Asiatic, African, or, of course, Jewish blood.

The Nazi use of genealogy was outrageous and inhumane, as was practically everything about Adolf Hitler's "Thousand-Year Reich." Purchasing this *Ahnenpaß* has led me to consider how genealogy -- for most of us our favorite activity (before I receive some off-color comments, perhaps I should say that it is one of them) -- has been misused." 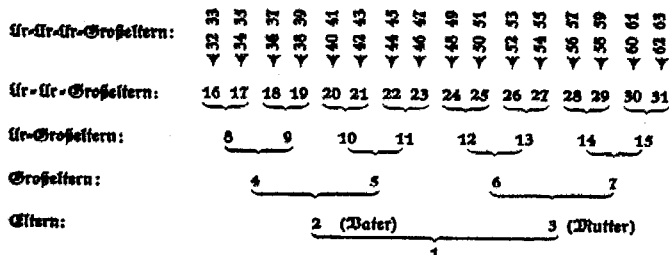
# Reading the Ahnenpaß

An *Ahnenpaß* is an "ancestor passport," which many Germans were required to complete during the Third Reich. (Many Germans who held less sensitive positions were not required to complete them.)

The *Ahnenpaß* from which the excerpts on these pages were copied was purchased for €5 at a flea market in Germany. What is unusual here is that accompanying the *Ahnenpaß* was a stack of every one of the official church records, signed and marked with a seal, that verified each of the entries in the book – all of that included in the € 5 price. On page 83, samples of these "proof papers" signed by church officials are reproduced.

The double page below shows the *Ahnentafel* of Anna Marie Albine Martha Eisenhardt, born in 1905 in Mühlhausen. Her name appears at the bottom, with her forbears listed from bottom to top – parents (*Eltern*), grandparents (*Großeltern*), great-grandparents (*Urgroß-*

eltern), and great-great-grandparents (*Ur-Urgroßeltern*).

Note on the numbering-structure chart above that another level is included, that of the 32 great-great-grandparents (*Ur-Ur-Ur-Großeltern*).

The *Ahnenpaß* is not commonly available because many holders destroyed them after the war, as protests against them for their aim of proving "racial purity."

**The Third Reich's genealogy directive produced these all-but-forgotten—until now—documents naming millions of German ancestors.**

From one of history's darkest eras has emerged a rich but controversial set of records that represents a potential genealogical windfall for some American re-searchers. As part of Adolf Hitler's obsession with "purifying" the German race, young men who joined the infamous *Schutzstaffel*—the Nazi party's military arm known as the SS—had to prove their genetic wholesomeness by submitting applications containing ancestor charts (*Ahnentafeln* in German). Similarly, starting in 1933, federal, state and local employees had to purchase *Ahnenpasse* from the *Rasse und Sied-Iwigs Hauptamt* (Chief Office for Race and Resettlement). An individual had to get records showing his Aryan ancestry, then have a government official fill out this "ancestor passport."

As World War II ended, American forces seized those files, along with other Third Reich records, and microfilmed them in Berlin. Some were invaluable in prosecuting Nazi officials and tracing owners of property taken from Holocaust victims. But the *Ahnentafel* films languished largely unnoticed in the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA). Then in 2003, German genealogy expert John T. Humphrey happened upon them, and they've become an all-consuming research and book-writing project.

"This totally unexplored record group has enormous potential for Americans and Germans looking for ancestral information, but they're not readily accessible because they're not indexed and all the records are in German," says Humphrey, who encounters mostly German-speakers and professional historians during his NARA research sessions. "You need special skills to use them."

The files take up 7,800 microfilm rolls and document as many as 14 million people, since many of the charts stretch back six generations into the mid-1700s. They include vital records, medical information, correspondence and biographical details, as well as charts for prospective brides of SS members.

Humphrey realizes the history of the German SS surrounds these records with controversy and, for some whose ancestors are named in the charts, could cast a shadow over an otherwise heady research discovery. But he stresses their significance for studying earlier history. "These records have information on Germans born long before there was a Nazi party or an Adolf Hitler, and many of those Germans were the parents and grandparents of people who had immigrated to the United States," he says. Even researchers whose ancestors aren't named in the *Ahnentafeln* could benefit: Since certain surnames are unique to particular areas of Germany, the records could point to likely ancestral places of origin.

The original *Ahnentafeln* are in Berlin's Bundesarchiv, where privacy laws keep them inaccessible. "Some people whose information is in these records aren't too much older than I am," Humphrey says. The microfilm--part of Record Group 242, Collection of Foreign Records seized--is at NARA's College Park, MD, facility (301-837-2000), <[archives.gov/dcmetro/college-park](http://archives.gov/dcmetro/college-park)> For more information on this records group, see <[archives.gov/research/captured-german-records](http://archives.gov/research/captured-german-records)>

## **Speaker on April 23, 2010 at BCGS**

**Ray Thompson, PhD:** PowerPoint presentation describing the vast resources of the Nabb Research Center at Salisbury University. The facilities will also be described. Following that, Thompson will outline some of the major types of collections. Finally, new and unique collections will be highlighted, including the map and newspaper resources available at the Center. Expansion of collections policy will also be outlined, demonstrating the importance of artifacts and ephemera in historical research.

G. Ray Thompson, PhD has been a professor of history at Salisbury University for 37 years. He co-founded the Nabb Research Center for Delmarva History and Culture at Salisbury University. He currently serves as the director. He conducts an annual Delmarva Regional History Symposium on “Delmarva Roots”. He is the author/compiler of more than two-dozen monographs on Delmarva and her historic records. He developed “DelmarvaSettlers.org”, providing a digital format venue for seventeenth century Delmarva records. He also developed “DelmarvaHistory.org”, which includes Delmarva-related records from the period prior to European settlement to the present. For a number of years, he had a daily radio program “Delmarva Flashbacks” on a local radio station and now he is a frequent guest on “The Delmarva History Minute” on WBOC TV. He earned an MA. in Ancient History and a PhD. in Ancient Greek/Roman History and Archaeology, with a minor in American Colonial history from the University of Kansas.

**The Edward H. Nabb Research Center for Delmarva History & Culture at Salisbury University collects and preserves archival material, artifacts, books - including family history, maps, and microfilm pertaining to the Delmarva Peninsula. Delmarva includes the Eastern Shore of Delaware, Maryland and Virginia and was a gateway from the Chesapeake Bay region in the earliest days to the bounty and promise of America.**

The mission of the Nabb Research Center is to cultivate and sustain the advancement of scholarly research through collecting, preserving, disseminating and providing access to records and artifacts which illustrate the rich historical and cultural heritage of the greater Delmarva region. The Center is open to all scholars, historians and genealogists researching the region of the Eastern Shore of Delaware, Maryland and Virginia.

### **Our Mission**

The mission of the Nabb Research Center is to cultivate and sustain the advancement of scholarly research through collecting, preserving, disseminating and providing access to records and artifacts which illustrate the rich historical and cultural heritage of the greater Delmarva region.

As part of its mission, the Nabb Research Centers also:

- introduces students, potential students and other interested persons to the vast historical, archeological and cultural heritage of Delmarva
- offers students a strong foundation in a variety of specialized studies in history, folklore and related fields
- serves as a foundation for life-long learning and research
- provides opportunities for interaction with the local and national community of researchers, educators, business leaders, family historians and others interested in Delmarva history and culture

### **Who is the Nabb Research Center for?**

The Center is open to all scholars, historians, and genealogists of all skill levels with an interest in the region of the Eastern Shore of Delaware, Maryland, and Virginia. Many historians and genealogists have traveled from all across the country to visit the Center to acquire a richer understanding of the greater Delmarva region and to examine artifacts and documents from the area, the majority of which can be found only at the Nabb Research Center.

The Nabb Research Center has been endowed by Edward H. Nabb, an attorney and philanthropist of Cambridge, Maryland, as a repository for material pertaining to the Delmarva Peninsula (Delaware, Maryland, and Virginia). The Nabb Research Center was established to provide a "laboratory" for history students and a liaison between Salisbury University and the lower Eastern Shore region.

This centralized repository of materials serves:

The Delmarva community at large, as well as family and local history researchers from across the nation

Professional business people including lawyers, surveyors and journalists

Students and scholars researching material for doctoral dissertations, master's degree theses, and school projects

### **Our Vision**

As an integral part of the Salisbury University Blackwell Library, the Edward H. Nabb Nabb Research Center for Delmarva History and Culture will be a recognized institution in the Delmarva region and around the country for its advanced preservation and understanding of the area's local history and cultural heritage. The Center will become a primary resource for students, historical organizations, and scholars for all of their research needs and individual learning purposes.

### **Our History**

In 1982, when faculty members Dr. Ray Thompson and Sylvia Bradley decided that history was too important to be taught specifically for secondary education, the primary goal for most history majors at the time, they took measures in their own hands and started a research center for the use of all students. Recognizing that historical land records, inventories and wills dating back to earliest colonial days were contained in as many as 36 different repositories scattered throughout the peninsula, Dr. Ray Thompson and Sylvia Bradley initiated an ambitious program of microfilm acquisition, which was generously and enthusiastically supported by local researchers and family historians. Thus, the Archives Center (as the Nabb Center was formerly called) was born.

During the next decade, the Archives Center underwent several changes including moving to a new location on the second floor of Holloway Hall, an addition of approximately 100 collections, and a merge with the Folklore Archives, headed at the time by Dr. Polly Stewart. This collaboration with the Folklore Collection resulted in changing the name from Archives Center to the Research Center for Delmarva History and Culture at Salisbury State University. In January 1992, the Research Center relocated once again to the Power Professional Building, where it presently resides.

The Center quickly became a popular repository for family journals and papers, surveyors' and civil engineers' papers, maps, research notes of local historians, book and pamphlet collections, business records, and other ephemera. By 1995, approximately 1400 reels of microfilm were accessioned and shelved. These microfilms contain permanent film copies of all kinds of documents from bank statements to newspapers and government records. The microfilms are merely 1% of the document's original size, perfect for condensed storage space,

and can last up to 900 years when stored in special envelopes in the correct climate-controlled conditions.

An endowment of \$500,000 by Edward H. Nabb, Sr. in June of 1998 resulted in greater funding from Salisbury University and the modification of the name to the Edward H. Nabb Research Center for Delmarva History and Culture. This remarkable donation is merely one installment of Edward H. Nabb's generous nature. Nabb was a member of the oldest law firm in Maryland, Harrington, Harrington and Nabb, for over forty years, he became the epitome of dedication. As president of the Nathan Foundation for over twenty-five years, he oversaw the presentation of over \$600,000 in scholarships awarded to students attending Salisbury University who otherwise could not have afforded to go. Without a doubt, Edward H. Nabb, Sr. is one of the most imperative entities in the advancement of the Research Center and Salisbury University both. The Research Center has assisted the greater Delmarva area for nearly three decades and will continue to do so in the future. It has given a home to the stuff of family attics, storage sheds, and back offices; precious and irreplaceable documents which few citizens have the skills or resources to preserve for themselves, but now can be shared by the community for generations to come.

The Baltimore Sun 1837 - 1985 is the topic of today's discussion.

This series is copied from microfilm and is searchable how ever it searches based on the way words look and not on the actual letters. This may result in articles not found or articles found that are not a match. There are ways around this.

## **Search Tips**

- Use "quotation marks" to search for exact phrases.
- 2 word queries (such as **circus elephant**) are searched as an exact phrase by default.
- 3 word queries (such as **new york orchestra**) are searched as words that need to appear in proximity to each other by default.
- Use special characters and operators (below) to focus your query.

## Truncation and Wildcard Characters

- \*** The symbol \* is used as a right-handed truncation character only; it will find all forms of a word. For example, searching for **econom\*** will find "economy", "economics", "economical", etc.
  - ?** The symbol ? is used to replace any single character, either inside the word or the right end of the word.  
? cannot be used to begin a word.  
For example, searching for **wom?n** will find "woman" and "women." Searching for **t?re** will find "tire", "tyre", "tore", etc.

More Search Options may be the best help

Select Document type

Types include, Birth Notice, Classified ad, Editorial, Fire Loss, Front Page, Legal notice, Marriage, Obituary (which also includes death notice, lodge notices, memorials), Photos standalone.

Results may be sorted oldest first, most recent first, or most relevant first.

If an exact date is not known I find it best to search Most Recent First with a Before this date selected

When searching for a death notice or obituary when date of death is unknown search the paper based on names that you know

For example: Naylor AND Levi

Searching other indexes first may give dates to check, the Maryland State Archives has a death index, or check to see if someone has a family tree on line.

Other options may be to search on for other family members or if a cemetery name is known.

Searching for Burton and Waugh may find many burials at Waugh Chapel.

To view a document, right click on the link and click Open in New Tab, this will keep your original list of matches available. Also with this method more than one document can be opened for review, simply close any tab that is not a match.

The document may also be sent by email. The document that is sent by email will not have highlights on the page.

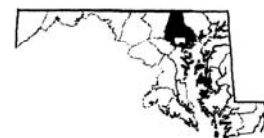

Our member Carol Porter compiled the index. We greatly appreciate Carol's work and look forward for her to continue this project.

### **Genealogical Tip of the Quarter:**

As a genealogist how many of us have a Will or Trust. Do you have plans as to where you want to be buried such as what cemetery plus what are your funeral arrangements with tombstone inscriptions? Or what will happen to your ashes? We are frustrated when we cannot find a Will or record for another ancestor or no tombstone. Do your family a favor and take care of these arrangements now and do not let someone else make your plans. Determine the cemetery and pre-pay for the funeral arrangements.

## U.S. Naturalization Records

The most useful naturalization records for genealogists are the applications filed by our ancestors to obtain U.S. citizenship. These are the Declaration of Intention ("First Papers"), which could be filed two years after the immigrant's arrival in the U.S., and the Petition for Naturalization ("Final Papers"), which could be filed after a waiting period of another three years. The citizenship certificate given to the immigrant contained relatively little information useful to genealogists, while the declaration and petition often included town and/or country of origin, occupation, date and port of arrival in the U.S., names of family members, and addresses. Some immigrants also changed their names at the time of naturalization, so name changes may also be recorded.

### A Brief History of Naturalization

For most of our nation's history, naturalizations could take place in any court—federal, state, or local. After the federal Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) was established in September 1906, procedures became more standardized and new forms requiring significantly more background information came into use. Until 1922, the husband's citizenship status determined that of his wife and minor children. Aliens serving in the military were granted concessions and are listed separately from ordinary naturalizations.

### How to Find Records

If you possess your ancestor's naturalization certificate, that document states the court where the naturalization took place, and the volume and number of the petition, making the location of the naturalization declaration and petition easier to identify. If he or she was naturalized in a federal court, seek the documents at NARA. If in a state or local court, determine where the records for the court are housed, such as the County Clerk's office.

It is possible to find naturalization records, however, without possessing a naturalization certificate. For information about where to find Federal, State, and local naturalization records, see Christine Schaefer, *Guide to Naturalization Records of the United States* (Baltimore, MD: Genealogical Publishing Co., Inc., 1997) **CGI CS49.S28**, and the sources listed below. For New York City naturalizations, see Estelle Guzik, "Finding Naturalization Records in New York City," *Dorot: the Journal of the Jewish Genealogical Society*, Volume 21, Number 2, 1999.

Footnote's Collection of Online Naturalization Records presently includes some online digitized naturalization records (indexed) for Maryland (1906-1930), Massachusetts (1906-1929), Pennsylvania (1795-1930), and Southern California (1887-1940); plus some indexes for New York City and State (searches are free; downloading copies of the documents requires payment). ## National Archives and Records Administration (NARA)

If the naturalization took place in a Federal court, then naturalization indexes, declarations of intent, and petitions will usually be in the National Archives regional branch serving the state in which the Federal court is located. Many indexes and records have been microfilmed. For the addresses and holdings of regional branches, see [www.archives.gov/facilities/index.html](http://www.archives.gov/facilities/index.html).

Some indexes to naturalization records cover not only federal but also local and state courts. One index for New York naturalization petitions filed in local, state, and federal courts in New York, Kings, Queens, and Richmond counties from 1792 to 1906 is available at the NARA New York regional branch and the New York Public Library. The index provides the court, date, and petition number.

## U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services

Since the creation of the federal Department of Homeland Security in 2003, the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) has replaced the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS). The new agency continues to maintain the Master Index to naturalization files. In 2008 the USCIS instituted a fee-for-service Genealogy Program which will provide researchers timely access to historical individual immigration and naturalization records. This program replaced earlier Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) requests. Requests under the new program will generally be a 2-step process in which the first step is a request to the USCIS to search the Master Index to determine what records, if any, are available for a \$20 fee. The second step is a request to copy relevant documents and records with fees ranging from \$20 to \$50. For more information and access to online requests, go to [www.uscis.gov](http://www.uscis.gov), click on “Services and Benefits” on top and then “Genealogy” on the left-hand side of the “Services and Benefits” page.

- The Jewish Genealogical Society, New York (JGS) has a searchable index for State Supreme Court, Kings County (Brooklyn) naturalization records from 1907 to 1924. See [www.jgsny.org/kingsintro2.htm](http://www.jgsny.org/kingsintro2.htm).
